
Management of Free Roaming Cat Populations in Slovakia: Attitudinal Perspectives of Residents Engaged with Unowned Cats – A Community Case Report

Methods



Results

- OF 276 RESPONDENTS 89% WERE WOMEN,
- 61% AGED 31-50 YEARS,
- 52% INVOLVED WITH THIS WORK FOR LESS THAN 5 YEARS.
- 75% NOT AFFILIATED WITH OFFICIAL ORGANISATIONS



- GENERALIZING VIEWS ON DOMESTIC CAT BEHAVIOUR
- CONFLICTING ATTITUDES TOWARDS POPULATION MANAGEMENT
- 16% EXHIBITED STRONGER OPINIONS SUGGESTING GREATER EMOTIONAL INVESTMENT



• FINANCIAL CONSTRAINTS ARE THE TOP CHALLENGE



- RECEPTIVE TO NEW LEARNING
- MOST PREFERRED TOPICS: TNR PROGRAM PLANNING AND STRATEGIES FOR CATS UNSUITABLE FOR RE-HOMING

Conclusions

This study is the inaugural analysis of the Slovak population engaged in the care of unowned cats, and our findings indicate that providing specialised, complimentary training programs for volunteers working with free-roaming cats may serve as an effective strategy to improve urban cat management in Slovakia.
